Jay Manthey's ride to Jubilee on March 13 started off in a Misty/Rainy combination. After a couple of flat tires, and a route mixup the group made a wet ride to Jubilee with a few on a side trip to Brimfield. The weather cleared by the end of the ride. (The reason the rain was ordered, Jay, was to slow you down so we can see what you look like - we usually just see a blur as you speed by!)

May 20 was a nice afternoon to ride - despite the 2" snowfall the night before in the outlying areas. A tandem led the ride up around Grandview Drive, for a few hills, and out to Junction City and back downtown.

The "Spring Break-Out" ride, held on April 3, was very successful. Twenty-three riders came out for the ride. A free membership and jacket was awarded to the "Bikie" who rode the farthest to the ride. MARK FILLIOTT left him home in Bloomington at 4:30 A.M. to ride to Peoria. BIKEWAYS: A GOOD INVESTMENT

Last month I started a series on the transportation problems this city faces (but refuses to recognize) and asked the city government to begin to show originality in their thinking.

Instead of looking at Peoria's streets and roads as the exclusive domain of motor vehicles, these rights-of-way should be considered integrated multi-purpose transportation corridors (to use terminology that bureaucrats thrive on). In other words, as streets are resurfaced or new streets are planned, bicycle and pedestrian lanes should be incorporated.

Separate bicycle lanes need not be built on each and every street in town. But connections from one part of town to the other via major streets should certainly be provided with a separate bicycle-pedestrial path.

Traffic problems are not solved by adding turn lanes or increasing the mumber of lanes from 2 to 4, or 4 to 6. Rather, increases in lanes often brings with it a more than proportional increase in traffic volume to give a net result of more congestion. What needs to be done is not to build build more parking garages or wider roads, but to encourage people to get out of their cars. Other forms of transportation are feasible, but not readily available.

No form of transportation can match the convience of an automobile. Many people would not give up this convenience regardless of the alternatives (short of no gasoline). But many would, and have. Several cities have proposed commuter bicycle paths. Peoria has several bicycle and pedestrian commuters.

Peoria once planned a bike-way once. Organized by the Explorer Scouts, it was described in the June 24, 1973 Journal Star as follows:

"What it could mean, ultimately, is a network of safe, marked bicycle lanes for use by shoppers, students, housewives, workers and businessmen, many who would use bicycles in place of cars for basic transportation—if they could do so safely."

". . . Peoria has no designated bicycle lanes or routes and riders are thrown into the dangerous situation of competing for street space with high-speed traffic, much of it hostile."

Thirty to 40 miles of bikeway in the area was planned. It was to use sidewalks, parking lanes and roadway shoulders protected by dividers or poles and marked with bike-way symbols. Estimated cost was \$ 40,000.

What happened? Almost nothing! A few bike-way signs were posted on some side streets and called a bike-way. Not only is it hard to follow, it goes nowhere and could get someone killed the process of trying to cross University or Main Streets.

The Club has a trails committee. Let's give this committee a lot of support and revive the in-town bicycle lane concept. If properly done, the cost to the city would be low indeed. But it must be planned soon-before work begins on up-grading existing streets.

Next month a feasible route will be outlined which could be marked and constructed this spring at very little expense. Will the city buy the idea? Call your councilman or woman and find out. If we can spend \$350,000 for a parking deck plan an elite few will use, we can afford \$40,000 for a bicycle path every Peoria family could use.

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If you have any opinion on this matter, perhaps it could also be expressed to the Sierra Club.

- TIME Sunday May 15, 1977 (rain or shine) 7:30 a.m. registration
- PLACE Idlewood Park, Morton, Illinois. South side of Morton by swimming pool.
- ROUTE is mainly over blacktopped, secondary roads, moderately flat. The ride will consist of a 100 mile tour through Spring Lake. will cut off and meander thru some of the Mackinaw river valley - rejoining the main route at Mackinaw.
- WATER & REFRESHMENT STOPS will be provided at the cut off for 50 milers, lunch at Spring Lake and where 50 milers join the 100 mile route. Routes pass some towns where additional carbohydrates may be found. Of course you may wish to carry some supplies to supplement the snacks pro-

- CAMPING Primitive camping facilities available at Oakwood Park two miles north COME SEE: MORTON PEDAL-IN C SPRINGFIELD RACE of Morton. Camping permit (\$2) available at Police Station.
 - MOTEL ACCOMMODATIONS: Field Lodge on the south end of Morton, Town House Motel -2 locations - one north and one on the west side of Morton. Note -Morton is eight miles east of Peoria.
