### TICKETS FOR HIBELL LECTURE - On Sale August 25

You have read in previous newsletters of IVW's plans to bring Ian Hibel to Peoria on Thusday, October 20 (7:30 P.M., Unitarian-Universalist Church) to tell of his worldwide cycling adventures. Tickets go on sale August 25 at our club meeting and then to the public through Illinois Cycle and Competition Cycle (cosponsors of Ian's visit).

Who is Ian Hibel? Well, he grew up in a small town near London. During his school years his sense of adventure and liking for travel was heightened through solo and group bicycle tours. Later he joined the Royal Air Force. Planes were then his magic carpet to exotic locales of Asia and Africa. The routine of RAF life soon prompted Ian to return to England where, during his employment at an electronics factory, he found the opportunity to tour the rural surroundings and such rugged places as the barren interior of Iceland.

Ian soon tired of factory life, was granted a year's leave of absence at his request, and embarked on a global exploration that would last for more then 10 years. Needless to

say he never did return to the factory.

For a time, Illinois was Ian's temporary home as he inspected boots at a shoe factory for income and toured the midwest. It's said that after "a year of midwestern flatlands

and the endless march of boots" he sensed that it was time to move on again.

During the next few years Ian cycled in Alaska and the Orient, then headed for Australia. While bicycling through Indonesia, Ian encountered wild boars, witch doctors, and waist deep mud. He contracted malaria. He spent time in New Zealand. While supervising a youth hostel for two years he would chat with other world travelers and plan his next adventure.

That next adventure for Ian lasted three years. It covered 18,000 miles - from southern South American up the Pan-American Highway to Circle City, Alaska. Ian returned home after this journey to write and lecture on his explorations - but still his sense of

adventure had not been fully satisfied.

Ian's most recent cycling accomplishment is his 8,000 mile trip from North Cape, Norway to South Africa - which you have heard briefly about.

What an extraordinary cyclist! Now in his forties it might be guessed that Ian will end his globe cycling expeditions with this laster accomplishment. Perhaps he will tell us on October 20th when he is here to show us what he has seen and tell of his experiences.

### Rambling Rally Ride - Sunday, September 4

We have something new and different from Les Siegrist and Bill Perry. It's a bike rally. You determine your speed. It's a twenty mile course, you tell us how much time it will take you to cover the distance. This is a club first as far as we know. Meet us at 8:15 at the square in Washington for our RAMBLING RALLY RIDE. Sign in, declare your riding time, get instructions and everyone leaves promply at 8:30 A.M. We can't tell you where the 20 miles is headed but we can say it will be flat country roads with no hills. Three gift certificates in the amounts of \$15, \$10 and \$5 will be awared to IVW members who come closest to guessing the correct length of time. This will split the prizes. Anyone can ride, but only club members can win the prizes. If you are not a member, it only \$4.00 to become one (just call an officer listed on the front of the Bulletin for a membership application). All of those members who haven't ridden with the club this year, this is our challenge to you to come our for this event.

### Moonlight Century - August 27, Saturday night

Doug Bertram came up with thie ride - one hundred miles by moonlight! He likes the idea of riding amidst lights and shadows and then watching the sun rise after an all-night ride. Nature will provide us with a full moon on this evening; club members will provide two sag wagons, one in front and one in back. Meet at the north side of the Holiday Inn in East Peoria near the I-74 ride at 10 p.m. Bring your own sandwiches. Depending on the weather, lemonade or hot chocolate will be provided. BIKE LIGHTS, front and rear, are a must. Any person without battery or generator lights will not be allowed to ride. Reflectors cannot be seen by drivers. WEAR BRIGHT REFLECTIVE CLOTHING AND BRING EXTRA BATTERIES.

### Ride Reports:

- July 10 Washington to Eureka Ten riders - beautiful and cool morning. Two teenage boys from Washington joined us, riding from their homes in the country. One had a CB with a 7 ft. antenna on the back of his bike! The antenna was quite lethal when it started swaying.
- July 17 Eureka to Goodfield We took my favorite route to Goodfield; the way there is level ground and straight, the way back is hilly and full of curves. We had eight people turn out, one was new and helped with the sag wagon. We had one breakdown - Doug Bertram had spokes break on his tandem - too many to continue riding the bike. No trouble at all to give him and his bike a ride back to Peoria.
- July 24 Peoria to Morton Four people showed up for this ride. This was during Cat's vacation, so some of us were on vacation and some of us went on the Elroy-Sparta bike ride.
- July 23-24 Elroy-Sparta Bike Trail We had a very good time on this ride with five members of the Peoria Ski Club. Several IVW members stopped by to ride part of the trail. This trail is worth it just for the tunnels. The tunnels are dark, eerie, and wet (and no, you don't ride your bike through them). Sparta was having a bike celebration Saturday night, so we saw Drum and Bugle Corp, genuine Indian dances with audience participation and several all girl baseball games. Plenty to do and see.
- July 29 Eureka Moonlight ride I finally had to take my turn at driving the sag wagon. Thirteen of us rode by a full moon to Goodfield and back. Everyone wanted to take the hilly way back, hardy souls that they were. We had six new people, three of which rode a night ride with us last year. I understand they meet Sunday mornings at six a.m. to ride! Snacks complete with chocolate chip cookies afterwards.
- July 31 Pekin to Tremont (Dillon?) A new member of IVW this year, Dennis Siemsen volunteered to lead a ride, and of course, we took him up on his offer. He had planned the ride to Dillon but someone decided to ride through Tremont. And Tremont is where we lost each other. Some stopped at the cafe, others rode through Tremont without stopping. One group turned left out of Tremont, the other group went straight. We never met up again until the end of the ride. Beautiful day - new people - stopped and talked to Jim Ellington.



USCF Races -

Milwaukee Super Week

Rich White was unable to place.



Sunday July 10 race, was held in downtown Milwaukee. Paul places 27th in a 58.5 mile CAT I & II race. Steve B. placed 5th while Dave suffered from a pedal in his spokes and was unable to continue. Rich White was unable to keep up with the 26 MPH pace.

Jay west to St. Louis on Sunday and placed 10th.

Paul raced on Tuesday at Holy Hill but suffered a falt on Lap 1 and was unable to catch the pack.

Steve and Rich rode the Time Trial (27 miles) on Wednesday morning. Steve placed 3rd (min. off the winner but 2 sec. off 2nd. with a 1:07:25 (25 mph).

Wednesday night was a Sr. I & II point race near the lake on the South side of Milwaukee in which Paul stayed with the pack but was unable to gain any points. Steve, Rich, and Dave raced in the Sr. III, IV, VETS & WOMENS race which was ridden half its distance in the dark. Steve placed 5th, Dave had problems in the park and Rich got dropped. The III's were lapping as fast and faster than I & II's.

Thursday was a Sr. III, IV, VETS, WOMEN'S Road Race on a 3 mile course for 36 miles in Grant Park, an extension of the course used in May. Steve placed 8th while Dave suffered leg cramps.

Friday was the Milwaukee International a Sr. I, II & III points race in downtown Milwaukee. Paul rode in the pack while steve rode 45 of 55 laps with the pack before quitting a race which set a new record by averaging 30 MPH for 80 Km (50 miles).

Saturday was a road race along the northern lake front on a 2 mile course. Paul rode with the pack but was unable to place in the 60 mi. I & II race. Steve placed 5th in the 30 miles Sr. III IV, Vets, Women's race. Dave crashed in the sprint and required some stiches and lots of bandages.

Sunday was a Sr. Handicap with the III & IV's receiving an 8 Min. lead. Steve quit after being dropped after 25 miles following a prime sprint which reduced the III, IV field to less than 20 riders. Paul rode in the chasing I/II field but did not place.

It should be remembered that Paul was racing against most of our Olympic and International team riders with Wayne and Dave Stetina putting on an impressive performance. There were several foreign riders also present.

The CAT III riders also demonstracted their worth by consistantly lapping as fast as the I & II's although for shorter distances. \*
