president's notes ... Recent conversation among IVW members has been centered around what is the best riding formation during our regular club rides. I'm sure all of us have seen almost every combination of front to rear spacing as well as single, double, triple and quadruple file, which could be on narrow single lane country roads, two lane township roads, two lane state highways, multiple lane highways or multiple lane one-way city streets.

The Illinois Vehicle Code, as presently written, is not specific as concerns the place of the cyclist on the road. The 1981 code was specific- the cyclist should assume a single-file position or move to the right-hand side of the road as far as possible in the presence of a motor vehicle. The 1982 code is not as specific and it seems understandable that a Morton policeman in particular could be confused as to enforcement of the code.

It is predicted by responsible D.O.T. personnel that the Vehicle Code will be changed to allow double file group riding. This would conform to the thoughts of a strong bicycle lobby in Washington

With the law in flux, it is important that the I.V.W. consider etiquette as its guide. I hope members would consider themserves a group on group rides first and foremost, and as individuals second.

To me, this means when a motor vehicle is present, the club should move to the right and form a single file. The only exception I can envision is possible multiple files while riding on one-way multiple lane streets and occupying one lane.

The three-day Labor Day weekend ride was well attended, and many of those attending were beginning riders who had trained for the event with a series of PACRACC warmup rides in the weeks preceding Labor Day. For this newspaper to take on a major ride (attendance 300) and pull it off without any major problems is a tribute to the dedicated and determined team that thought the ride important enough to pay attention to the details. The IVW could learn quite a lot from the PACRACC. Next year, our members should look to this ride as a out-of-town magnet as powerful as the Hilly Hundred. Kudoes. (215 miles)

Committees will be forming to take care of the club's ongoing rides and activities. The newsletter will also need an editor for the January issue, which comes out one week before the 4th Thursday in Dec. The December issue will be the last produced by the current editor, so a replacement will need to be found, for the status quo will be unable to continue into the next year, due to other commitments.

Crood for thought. Everyone who is an experienced rider can spot the beginner, right? Weaving from side to side down the wrong side of the road, the beginner tempts tradgedy with every oncoming car. The rank novice, noting that the bicycle is neither car nor pedestrian, ambles on-blind to the traffic controls that govern those on foot and behind the wheel. So, where are the experienced riders in the IVW? One recent Sunday, these experts (without weaving at all side-to-side) bravely proclaimed their freedom from downtown Peoria traffic lights by zooming straight through them. No wonder that responsible cyclists in the community are harassed by motorists recalling this and similar charges of the Light Brigade. No wonder that few will risk their names as appointed ride leaders. And no wonder that so many cyclists are confused as to how to ride in any type of traffic density. The IVW risks being eclipsed by a moon of

community disgust. This moon does not describe an orbit, throwing its shadow on everything in its path, but is stationary, allowing the unthinking to move under its glaring black light. It is easy to pull back from the dangerous orbit we are entering, if we will only face the problem as a serious one. There are too many beginners on the road today with bikes worth more than their common sense. There are not enough skilled riders with knowledge extending beyond the name on their seatpost or derailleur. There are tragedies willing to teach us if we refuse to educate ourselves. A helmet's protection is not absolute, and a rear view mirror is nothing if we can not see in front of us. The IVW is growing too large, too fast to turn into a group of permanent beginners. How many years of experience does it take to turn a cyclist into a vegtable? -- s. joslin




