



#### I.V.W. WINTER RIDE SCHEDULE:



Pedaling down the road on your "Century" have you had the feeling of your foot going asleep from the ball of the foot forward? You now have the new medical condition called "Wheelperson's Foot.


This condition can be caused by one of two problems- cutting off circulation or pressure on the nerve endings of the feet.

Both of these causes can be corrected by doing two simple things. The easiest solution is to conscienously THINK about your pedal pushers & relax your toes & wiggle them. This relaxes the structures of your foot to allow the blood to flow easier & eliminates the gripping of the toes which causes severe pressure of the nerve ends which causes numbness (pressure anesthesia).

The other solution to the problem is wearing a GOOD biking shoe with rigid sole. The flexible shoe allows TOO much direct pressure on the ball of your foot.

Remember to prevent that numb feeling while biking, wear good shoes & wiggle those little "piggies".
