#### MORE ON SAFETY

The following article comes from the Newsletter of the East Bay Bicycle Coalition in Oakland, Ca. Spring'84

#### THE BICYCLISTS BILL OF RIGHTS

1. This is the guiding principle of the Bicyclists' Bill of Rights: that bicyclists have the right to the respect due all travellers.

It is a basic rule of law that the streets belong to the people for travel and transportation, whether for business or pleasure, and that their use is not a mere privilege, but a common and fundamental right. All persons have an equal right to

use the streets, with due regard for the corresponding

rights of others. 2. Bicyclists have the right to full access to roads, with status and treatment equal to those of other travellers. Where freeways, expressways, bridges, or tunnels provide exclusive access to a destination, they must be open to bicyclists, motorist who adversely affects or a convenient and reasonable alternative must ensure that bicycles can travel wherever the roads go. Neither special facilities nor any plan or policy must deny cyclists full access to roads, or interfere with the operation of bicycles as vehicles.

3. Bicyclists have the right to expect that roads be designed, constructed, and maintained to treat vehicular cyclists as legitimate road users. This includes the provision of adequate lane and shoulder width, a smooth clean, and level surface, wheelproof drainage, and traffic signals that respond to and can be seen by cyclists in proper roadway position.

4. At their destinations, bicyclists have the right to parking. Where ordinances or policies require parking for automobiles, they must also provide parking for bicycles. This parking should be secure against theft, vandalism, traffic, and weather, and must not damage the bicycle. 5. Bicyclists have the right to expect all levels of government to integrate bicycles into transportation, land use, and general planning for residential, commercial, and industrial purposes, and into permit and review process. 6. Bicyclists have the right to laws that treat the bicycle clearly, directly, and uniformly as a vehicle subject to vehicular traffic rules. Existing laws must be construed with the presumption that cyclists are legitimate road users. Statutes that have been interpreted otherwise must be amended or repealed. 7. Bicyclists have the right to strict enforcement of fair laws impartially against motorists and cyclists. Police should cite every a cyclist by disobeying the traffic rules, and every cyclist who disobeys a rule for drivers of vehicles. Courts must apply traffic laws fairly and consistently. Because cyclists are especially vulnerable, punishment for drunk driving must be swift, severe, and certain. 8. Bicyclists have a right to education, so that all road users may share the highways safely and amicably. This means training cyclists of all ages to ride as a responsible, law-abiding driver of vehicles. It also means training motorists, police officers, and courts to respect and understand the role of bicyclists as equals on the roads.


9. Bicylcists have the right to respect for their experience and knowledge as bicvclists, and to be consulted on matters that concern them.
