PRESIDENT'S NOTES ---

The most frustrating aspect of cycling for me has to be the wide gap between the marketing of cycling and the realities of

Does it really make any difference whether your bicycle's frame is make of aluminum, steel, or zinc if the condition of the roads in your area make riding an accomplishment instead of a pleasure?

Why are people constantly apologizing that their bicycles are not the quality they should be? Does the bike do the job? why do people buy cheap Or the reverse; throwaway bicycles because "I'm not going to ride that much anyway"? Why not cut out the middleman and spend the money on another tank of gas for the Belaire?

Why do people buy dropped bar bicycles and then demand brake extension levers and stem shifters for an upright riding position?

Why do people ride against traffic because "I'm afraid cars are going to hit me", and then choose to ride on University and Prospect at night without lights?

Yu ever wunder, Vern?

This isn't an attack on that portion of the bicycle world known as marketing. In some ways, they are the only ones doing their jobs.

If a bicycle manufacturer decides it wants to make brake extension levers and stem shifters for a bicycle, a marketer will attempt to make it desirable (or vice versa). If the industry wants to make a cheap bike the marketer will sell on price; if its an expensive bike, he'll sell on mystique. The marketing people work hard.

In the big picture, the item that is missing is the conduit for practical cycling knowledge. The reason may be because there is no apparent financial benefit to teaching kids to ride with traffic; there are no apparent economic incentives to local governments to provide streets designed with bicycle traffic in mind.

Whatever accurate cycling information is available usually comes from bicycle clubs. And clubs are usually apathetic to such a function.

In the big picture, the money spent by the McLean Wheelers on safety brochures (see mailbox) is a small step; but it is a first step and one bicycle clubs should consider -- making themselves the marketers of cycling safety.



Be sure to get your application in early as the ride is limited to the first 1000 applicants. Also if you want a T-shirt out of the deal, you need to order it before the ride. The Saturday ride can be a 25 mile spin or a 100 mile adventure. The choice is yours, but remember: the rest of us will have a lot more fun with you than without Sunday's ride is the locally famous Tour of Peoria, a 35 mile trip covering the high points of Western Civil-ization as interpreted by natives of Peoria, Illinois.

All riders will receive a terrific picture of themselves as they were before the ride. Interesting trivia -- many of the cyclists you will meet on June 21 & 22 have completed or attended fifth grade.



OUT OF TOWN RIDES ---

The following are mostly invitational rides run by other clubs in the Midwest. More information is available by contacting Sam at 682-8777 and asking for it.

Keep in mind the rides run by the Spoon River Wheelmen. The first is a mountain bike ride called Assault on Mt. Horrible. Distances are 30-50-80 miles and the madness begins Sunday July 27 at Bernadotte River Park. Entry fee is \$6 before July 20 and \$9 after. The SRW's second invitational is the Spoon River Scenic Century Sept. 14 in Canton. Distances are 30-60-75-100 miles. The IVW had a big turnout at this ride last year; as good as the ride was, there should be more of us down south again this year. For more information on either of these two rides write:

The Macomb Bicycle Club holds the Spring Double Metric Century May 31 and June 1. The ride begins and ends in Macomb with overnight camping in Nauvoo. Among other things the ride includes baggage and sag service.

Kankakee is the start for the 8th annual $\underline{\text{Two}}$ Rivers/Iron Bridge Century June 8. Distances are 35,62,100 miles. The 100 mile loop features a stop at the historic Buckley Homestead comprised of one-room school, log cabin, barns, etc. Fee is \$5.50 before May 30 and includes map, lunch, sag and patch.

Bikeburlington is promoting <u>ILIAMO</u> a two-day bicycle tour for the serious rider (quote) Distance is 107 miles each day. Ride begins in West Burlington and an evening meal is provided in Hannibal. A baggage truck is provided but no sag. Sleeping and shower space is provided in Hannibal. Food stops, patch, fanny bumper, maps, marked route also included in the \$25 entry fee. Date June 28-29.

The 13th annual Apple Cider Century in Three Oaks Michigan is September 28.
Distances are 25-50-75-100 miles. They say they are America's biggest one-day century event with 4500 cyclists participating in 1985. The Three Oaks Bicycle Club wants you to enter no later than July 15. The minimum entry fee of \$17 includes map, markings, sag, flag, patch, spaghetti dinner; T-shirt is available. They've got a huge brochure folks; you can read it all.

Folks of Note ---


