AN OPINION ON THE NAME CHANGE PROPOSAL

When the initial name change proposal was discussed (and defeated) at the August meeting I suggested that we rename ourselves the "Peoria Bicycle Club". In addition to stating exactly who we are, the name leaves no doubt as to where our club is based. Our current name — and the latest proposal, "Illinois Valley Bicycle Club" — are not so good in that respect. Don't we always refer to Peoria anyway when we're at out-of-town events and are asked where we're from? Those of us from the smaller communities of Washington, Chillicothe, etc. have to do that. I suppose that if some members felt that using "Peoria" was too specific, we could use "Peoria Area" or "Greater Peoria" — but why? Let's keep it simple. Another Peoria Bicycle Club was an important part of Peoria's history 100 years ago. So, while the "Peoria Bicycle Club" name is a very practical, non-sexist name, it's also one which we can proudly resurrect.

I would like to urge defeat of the "Illinois Valley Bicycle Club" name proposal at the October meeting and adoption of "Peoria Bicycle Club" as soon as our by-laws permit.

FROM THE EDITOR

Ron Anderson's suggestion for a new name for our club (see above) is a good one and it probably is the second most mentioned choice for our name. I would have no problem supporting this change if it is the majority choice; it certainly is practical.

Ron is a long time member of the IVW and he is trying to overcome a second problem that some people have found with our present name: geographical identity. It is admirable that he, being from Washington, does not find the name "Peoria" too specific, as do several other club members from outlying communities. It is because of this often-expressed "community pride" of our suburban members that I am in favor of keeping the now traditional "Illinois Valley" in our name.

We do encompass a large geographical area including Pekin, which is not a suburb, but a substantial city in its own right. I feel geographical identity is only a small problem; the real problem we are trying to address is the obvious sexism of our present name. There are many other clubs around us that also have names that do not include a city: Bay Shore Bicycle Club (Green Bay), Blackhawk Bicycle Club (Rockford), and Prairie Cycle Club (Urbana), to name a few. Of course there are many more that do include their city's name, so Ron's suggestion does have precedent.

If you choose to reject the "Illinois Valley Bicycle Club" proposal then several members have volunteered to form a committee to explore possible names for the club. I hope this committee never has to be formed. We have much more important things for these good people to do than endless debates over our club's name! Let's get this issue behind us now.

I like the name "Illinois Valley". It has a lovely flow to it; it sounds "countryside" like the good things we enjoy about bicycling and the outdoors. It is the good part of our present name and represents the best part of our geography. Let's keep it. Let's just change the part that some of our members find objectionable (the old saw about babies and bath water applies here).

Constitutional changes require two-thirds support of members present. There are many other name choices that have some support but this is one that, while maybe not everyone's favorite, can be supported by most of us. I urge you to attend the October meeting and vote for it.


This was my first long bicycle trip but definitely not my last. I am looking forward to many rides next year, as I just joined recently, and work and time won't allow much this fall.
