PEORIA'S BICYCLING HISTORY

The book <u>BICYCLE FEVER</u> written by Steven Streight has just been published by Ruppman Marketing Services, Inc. in Peoria. This book, complete with rare photos, paints an excellet picture of bicycling in the "Central City" during cycling's early heyday (1800's). In those days, Peoria was a nationally recognized bicycling center complete with 8 cycling clubs, 5 cycle manufacturers, and a 1/2 mile race track (complete with large grandstands) in Lakeview Park. NEW 1991 RIDE COMMITTEE IS FORMED



Baltimore Bicycling Club voted to light up our lives in a way that counts. Their financial support made possible the development and printing of Lighting the Way Ahead. Featuring graphics and maps, the 44-page special report on bicycle lighting and night riding zeroes in on problem areas such as confusing changes in requirements from state to state and inconsistent (or nonexistent) enforcement of requirements within a state. Florida scored a full eighty points in the Table 2 ranking of the states for requiring a white headlight visible 500 feet facing forward, a rear reflector and light visible for 600 feet, and for permitting a choice of where to affix lights and reflectors in addition to the ones required, either on the rider or the bicycle. 
Cyclists and Clubs: Make Your PEDAL FOR POWER Plans Now!

While it may be grey and verging on winter where you are now, spring and summer will arrive sooner than you imagine—especially if you start planning for a PEDAL FOR POWER trip now!

More than 160 cyclists have enjoyed both PEDAL FOR POWER options, and the word is spreading that these are *the* rides to go on. Already 23 cyclists have signed up for the 1991 PEDAL FOR POWER Across America, which departs Los Angeles on May 11, and arrives in Boston on June 27. The more than 65 cyclists on the 1990 PEDAL FOR POWER Across America had "the time of their lives." Indeed, many wished they could also do the 1990 North-South trip.

Participants on both PEDAL FOR POWER rides enjoy motels, ample food, sag support, ride leaders, and days of great cycling. Local clubs join in the effort as well, happily organizing ice cream parties and contributing their best recipes. (Note: 1990 PEDAL FOR POWER Across America cyclists fondly remember a homemade chocolate cake with powerful calories that was dished up in western Ohio by the Stark County Bicycle Club.)

PEDAL FOR POWER North-South leaves Portland, Maine, on Sept. 21 and arrives in Orlando, Florida, 23 days later. Delicious seafood, L.A.W. hospitality in Baltimore, and miles of eastern seaboard scenery await participants. Cyclists who can't join PEDAL FOR POWER on either one of these trips can contribute in other ways. Hosting a PEDAL FOR POWER party, escorting cyclists through town, or sponsoring a rider are just a few possibilities. n the face of the Iraqi oil crisis, the League has launched a public relations campaign to encourage the number of Americans commuting by bicycle. An increase in bicycle commuters, and the corresponding decrease in oil use, can help reduce our dependence on foreign oil and hence America's need to risk soldiers' lives in the Middle East. We are sending out press releases to some 1000 media outlets, offering reprints of our May 1990 article, "Bicycle Commuting," on receipt of \$.50 and a business size SASE. Some interesting facts came to light in researching for this: With 5% of the world's population, the U.S. consumes 28% of its oil, 63% of this being used for transportation. The U.S. annual expenditure for gasoline equals the annual cost of U.S. air pollution: \$100 billion.

1991 National Rally

The 1991 L.A.W. National Rally will be held in Olympia, Washington, over the Fourth of July weekend, July 3-7. Olympia is noted for outstanding road cycling and spectacular mountain biking. As an added bonus, the National Rally will be held concurrently with Probike Northwest, an educational symposium on bicycle planning, program development, and safety. The rally weekend will conclude with the Hamms Capital Lakefair Criterium bicycle race on the race grounds of the state capitol.

A whole range of pre- and post-rally tours is planned to help the visitor from afar to enjoy the magnificent scenery and cycling of the Pacific Northwest. You can cycle the San Juan Islands, go mountain biking in the nearby national forest, or enjoy a tour around Mount Rainier or Mount St. Helens as a part of your cycling vacation.
