> week with disgust because the

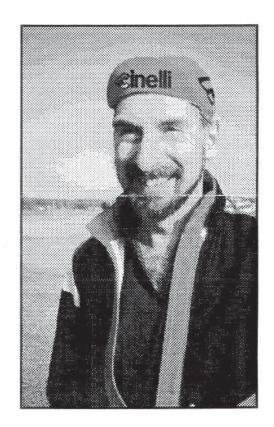
trays with FOOD between each rider for constant munching! After all, we ride to eat-right? I'm sure that if anyone

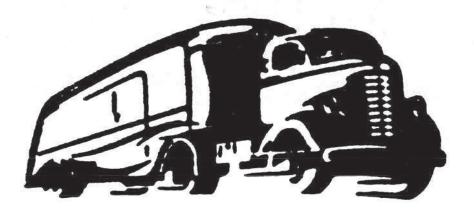


Newly elected IVW president Steve Shaffer denies links to organized whine syndicate.

The Lament of a Web Foot

Well, they aren't really webbed, but they may as well be when it comes to buying bike shoes. After some years of riding, what has brought about this conclusion?

Stoker Eileen and I went to Gear '91 at Williamsburg—a great even, but that's another story. At the start of one of the rides we decided to take advantage of the trial ride being offered by the Time pedal and shoe guys.

They had her size, but nothing for me. Maybe we were too close to the ride start time. The stoker half of the tandem got modernized for the ride. By the end of the 60 miles, stoker Eileen was ready

to abandon the toe clips forever, and I could tell a difference in our climbing ability.

So when we got home we sprang for two sets of Time Action shoes and pedals. At last, I could be clipless and slipless when landing. I've seen too many falls taken by tandem riders in conventional cleats to be interested in trying that myself.

However, I soon revisited my E-width bugaboo. It took a shoe about three sizes too long to get enough width. Apparently all European shoe designers believe all riders have Awidth feet. I wasn't gaining anything compared to being in toe clips. The length misfit was that bad. The Time shoes went back to the bike shop and the toe clips went back on the bike. I'm glad to have an understanding bike shop owner to work with.

So what's next? It will be a slow process, but I believe if all of us wide-foots deliver a message to the sellers of expensive, ill-fitting shoes we might get something to happen. We want fit or we'll have to do without. A few years ago Performance sold touring shoes in three widths. I wish I'd bougth three pair, because they're no longer available.

Write some letters, make your needs known and vote with your feet—walk away from shoes that don't fit.

Dear Dr. Derailleur,

I read somewhere that the average bicycle sold today, when reduced to its raw materials, is worth only about 39¢. Why did I pay \$1,800 for my new bike?

I'd say you got taken.

Even considering the large costs

involved in tooling and training, manufacturers can still produce a common garden-variety bicycle quite inexpensively when compared to the B-2 bomber or the space shuttle.

Of course, lightweight bicycles go through additional manufacturing steps to reduce weight. One of these involves a huge drill press which produces today's hollow frame tubing.

However, even lightweight bicycles cost the maker only about \$1.50 to complete (\$20 if shipped with a chain—chains take a long time to put together by hand). So I figure the dealer's markup at over 2,000 percent.

I just hope you kept the receipt.

By commuting on bikes instead of their cars FOS members saved 714 gallons of gas during 1991 (assuming cars getting 30 mpg; at 25 mpg, riding saved 857 gallons).

Considering using your bicycle for commuting? If you ride an average of three times a week, 40 weeks a year and your one-way distance to work is four miles, you'll pile up 960 pollution-free miles and save 32 gallons of gasoline (30 mpg car).

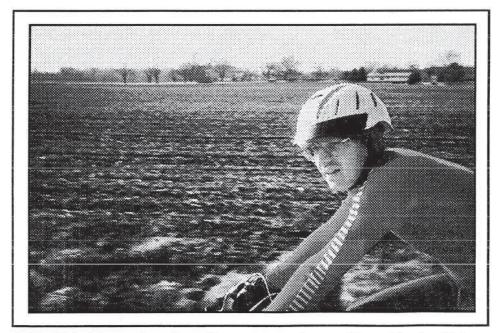

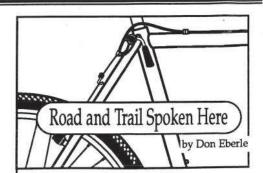

No, they do not plow the snow off the River Trail. But with enough snow, you can cross-country ski on it . . .

TOGIR bicycle tours will not operate this year due to high insurance stateside. They have one tour going to Europe this year. They hope to run again in 1993...

Riding in the city will not help build up your endurance—you must ride out in the country where you can go a longer distance and avoid stop signs. It all depends on how strong you want to get as to how often you ride. Riding one day a week will not help much. Riding is just like anything else—the more you put in it, the more you get out of it. You gotta have heart...

How about this? Shimano says they have an 80 percent share of the worldwide mountain bike components market. They say they have no serious competitors right now.

Any Town USA has a coffee shop. Our country starts the day on coffee and donuts so most shops open between 5:00–6:00 a.m. and close at 2:00 p.m. Some of these are open even on Sundays.

With so many Casey's and the like, this may soon change. But, in any case, stay away from the Interstate—you'll find better and cheaper food.

When Route 121 from Morton to Lincoln is completed, you won't be able to ride on it. There are access roads now open which run parallel to it—some of this route is new and some is old. It's a good north-south ride. On it, you can get down to Hopedale (more on this later). This is a better ride than the River Trail for people like us.

This past January I rode more miles than any previous January. The longest day was 61 miles.

Remember, in our state the bicycle is a vehicle and as such is subject to the rules of the road. The cars and trucks are faster than you are. Don't be dead right.
