

WHAT DOES BICY-CLING MEAN to you? Is it a form of transportation, recreation,

or is it simply exercise to be done because if you don't, Father Time takes his toll on your body? I ride for the last two reasons. It's just too easy to jump in the motorized vehicle to do the errands and besides, I'm a product of my environment. From the day I was born, I've been enamored with cars, and I still can't wait until the new models come out in the fall.

However, bicycling has brought some sense of balance back into my life. I now know that the cars I love are nothing more than vacuums that suck my wallet dry. That knowledge really takes the fun out of cars. The real question is how can I protect my children from an unreasoned love of cars? I suppose it's too late—they are already trying to save up for their first machines. They can barely afford the insurance, let alone all the other cost involved with ownership. But do they consider riding their bike to work, or walking, or public transportation? No, because it's not cool.

The biggest challenge facing bicycle enthusiasts is how to convince car-indoctrinated people to bicycle instead of drive. One of these days even I hope to reach instinctively for by bicycle instead of the car keys.

What else can the IVW do besides promote recreation, advocacy, social gatherings, exercise and eating?

We can work to improve everyone's cycling ability: whether goals are measured in quiet, personal progress; or outright success in the bike leg of the triathlon. Triathletes, for example, ride the bicycle differently than the method I've learned over the past eight years. Maybe we could teach each other some of the tricks of our trades.

The IVW is a bicycle club in which the main focus is fun and effective cycling. Effective cycling is everything from riding in traffic to improving area riding conditions to improving group riding skills. This year there is only one day during the week that does not have an organized ride. For anyone who would like to ride with the IVW, there is a ride for you.

SUNDAY, MAY 9. Thirteen cyclists led by Steve and Sue Weast left Jubilee at 8:30 for breakfast in


Princeville. The group decided to cut the ride short in the face of 15-20 mph SSE winds. 25 miles. (Hell hath no fury like a tailwind ignored.)

JOURNAL STAR STORY It's just a guess, but did Sue Brown write the story

the Journal Star expected to receive for its May 7 issue?

While the majority of the article was about the IVW's efforts to expand road access for bicyclists, the accompanying map and photo—not under Brown's control—were about area multi-use trails.

Don't get me wrong—I love both the press and the trails movement—but why is it when bicyclists say "roads," everyone around us hears "trails," "paths" and "sidewalks?" Ever feel like you're the only one who ever failed a word association test?

MAIL CALL What does it take to put the newsletter together? Well, it starts with a stack of paper consisting of 21 newsletters, a handful of ride brochures, an envelope full of stuff from the League of American Wheelmen, a couple of newspaper clippings and various contributions from IVW members including the ride schedule, an advocacy report, the president's notes and one or two other articles. It's not fun to cripple the mailman...but someone has to do it.

ALL THINGS BEING NORMAL Karen and I joined 210 riders on the McLean County Wheelers Spring Metric in mid-May. Windy? Suffice it to say that more than a couple of cyclists headed their bikes into the wind and quickly opted for the shorter course. Even Karen and I cut some hills off the long course to reward ourselves for our perseverance. The Wheelers have a beautiful figure-eight course down there north and west of Normal. Just wish they'd offer a vegetarian main dish for the after-ride meal. Karen hates to shell out that registration fee just to skip lunch.

THANKS FOR ASKING, BUT WE NEED MO TIME Got a letter from the Missouri Highway and Transportation Department (MHTD). The mailing announced the state's newest MHTD job title—Intermodal Planner—and gave a description of the job (the bicycle and pedestrian coordinator).

By golly, Missouri was asking for help in staffing the position! Just one problem—the letter was dated April 21 and the deadline was April 30. Nine days—hmm. Guess Missouri was worried about a flood of applicants (like when a new Wal-Mart is built). FYI: the position pays \$22,200 to \$30,804 per year.

SIX MONTHS AND COUNTING It just occurred to me—I haven't read Bicycling or Bicycle Guide since December. I'm sure I should've at least skimmed the table of contents each month, but I haven't. Information sources these days include Bicycle USA, VeloNews and the out-of-town newsletters in the IVW mailbag. Oh, and Beckler talks a lot.

FLASH! Brandywine/West-Aire Connector Completed

The city of Peoria, responding to the cards and letters of club members, has reopened the Brandywine/West-Aire intersection to pedestrian and bicycle traffic. The intersection, long blocked by landscaping and a steel guard beam, represents the first of 22 IVW-proposed projects to be completed.

Members should now thank the city by letter (write to city hall—address next page) and remind the mayor and council members that the Forrest Hill/Gale widening project—affecting roads which form the only continuous route across central Peoria from Prospect Avenue to Route 8—represents another opportunity to open the city to non-polluting, neighborhood-friendly bicycle use.

ACCESS THROUGH CEMETERY DISCUSSED—OWNER SAYS BICYCLISTS, RUNNERS, PEDESTRIANS WELCOME

In preparation for our Memorial Day ride through Peoria, we asked to pass through historic Springdale Cemetery (and tunnel under War Memorial Drive) from its new owner, Larry Leach. Mr. Leach not only said okay to our one-day request, he encourage future use of the cemetery by all forms of non-motorized traffic.

We were surprised to learn that the cemetery's main problem is not vandalism of monuments, but trash-dumping. Mr. Leach sees bicyclists/runners as conscientious users who will help promote and preserve Springdale as an historic and scenic attraction.

We (IVW) mentioned the need to modify Springdale's north and south entrance gates to allow full-time bicycle/pedestrian access. We also suggested a possible joint project between the cemetery and the IVW to help renovate the gates. Mr. Leach saw this as a win-win arrangement.

NOTE: Until more permanent access is established, please contact Mr. Leach at the Springdale office prior to taking a bike/running group through the cemetery.

TCRPC TO SURVEY AREA BICYCLE ACCESS NEEDS

The Tri-County Regional Planning Commission (TCRPC) is preparing a survey to measure the amount and extent of bicycle use in the Peoria area. The survey is also expected to gauge support for bicycle-related facilities improvement, including roads and parking.

Interest in creating the survey was sparked by the federal transportation budget passed in 1991 (ISTEA*). The enhancement program within that budget represents a potential source of funding for projects that increase utilitarian (rather than purely recreational) bicycle use.

The bicycle survey will be the first tangible product of the new Bicycle Access Task Force** headed by the TCRPC. Thanks to all IVW members who participated in the survey's creation.

IVW BRAINSTORMS BICYCLE ACCESS WITH TCRPC

A special meeting held April 28 and announced by a postcard and flyer campaign—was used to formally present the IVW's 22-project road improvement plan to members of the Tri-County Regional Planning Commission.

Copies of a map and a list outlining the proposals were handed to members of the audience which included IVW members, members of the public and TCRPC members.

Special emphasis was placed on the need for people to communicate with city leaders on the Forrest Hill/Gale avenues project. The audience was encouraged to fill out postcards asking the Mayor Maloof and Peoria city council members to support the "pro-bike" 14-foot outside lane proposal (see flyer on next page).



CLUB NEWSLETTER CLASS PROJECT

IVW

THERE ARE MORE VERSIONS of the March 1993 IVW newsletter than there are donuts in a baker's dozen. A total of 19 different layouts as a matter of fact.

Illinois Central College students taking Graphic Arts 240—an advanced graphics class with its focus on desktop publishing—were asked to redesign the newsletter for their final class project.

Instructor Sharon Conley said the students liked the project because it required more creativity than the more technical subjects covered during the semester. "I asked them to improve the newsletter, to jazz it up. They liked the project because it was different than the other assignments—it was connected to the world outside the classroom."

March artwork and articles were sup-

plied on floppy disc for the Macintosh computer-using class. In addition, copies of the club's "gab rag" were distributed to everyone.

Required in the redesign were page numbers, a mailing label, an events calendar and an application. While the name of the club couldn't be changed, several students created different versions of the newsletter's front page banner. And virtually all 18 people either created or scanned additional artwork.

In addition, class versions of the newsletter were printed in two colors (black and a color chosen by the student).

Half of the group was made up of graphic arts majors and half of design majors. At least six students already worked in the printing industry.

Conley was impressed with the results, and awarded eight people with A's on the project. "They're bright people," Conley said. "And everyone said a newsletter redesign should be assigned the next time the class is offered."
