# Mind Many Mega Miles

Or, how to use the 1995 IVW mileage log...

IT'S THAT TIME OF YEAR AGAIN: IVW MILEAGE LOG TIME! To celebrate, simply remove the big, double-sided 11" x 17" sheet from this newsletter and use a magnet to attach it to your refrigerator.

The IVW mileage log is the fun way to track your cycling progress in the new year. And it's easy to use, too. In fact, other bicycle clubs redistribute the IVW mileage log for the use of their own members.

Here are just a few of the things you can track:

- Mileage. This is basic. Just check your bicycle computer at the end of each ride and record the mileage in the box for that day. At the end of the week, total your weekly mileage. There's space for year-to-date mileage, too.
- Club mileage. If you would like to track your club mileage separately from your personal miles, draw a diagonal line through each box. Put your club mileage above the line and your personal mileage below. (This is a must for those members who want to compete for the Broken Saddle award).
- Weather. In the "notes" section, track daily temperature, humidity and wind direction. After a year of recording the weather (and how you dressed for it), you'll become a better planner.
- Maintenance. How many miles are you getting out of bearing overhauls? Your chain? Your tires? If you make a note every time you perform maintenance on your bicycle, you'll know.
- Indoor training. Keep track of the time—not the miles—you spend on stationary bicycles, wind- and mag-trainers. When you look at the log and see that you've ridden four times a week over three months, you'll know you're ready for spring.

New this year: Just to the left of the "Notes" section is a column marked "94 YTD." Fill the column with your weekly mileage totals from '94. Then you can measure your weekly mileage totals against last year's totals instantly. Or, if you didn't keep a log last year, you can fill the 94 YTD column with projected weekly mileage totals for '95 and measure your actual progress against your New Year's resolutions.

Your mileage log can be simple or complex. Tandem riders often maintain a joint log. Families may need additional logs to track each individual's progress. If you need extra logs, call Elizabeth Heuermann at 673-0098; she'll be happy to mail you additional copies. Happy record keeping!

# Deadline for plan; Lehman to close

IVW HELPS GUIDE LONG-RANGE PLAN. Under the requirements of

ISTEA\*, the Tri-County Regional Planning Commission (TCRPC) is preparing a 20-year transportation plan for the Greater Peoria area. On November 11, I met with John Boyle and Bayo Adanri (TCRPC staff) to give



input for the bicycle/pedestrian portion of the plan. I recommended that the long-range plan:

 Provide routine accommodation for pedestrians and traffic-tolerant bicyclists in all new road construction. Design features include wide outside traffic lanes, bicycle-safe drainage grates and bicycle-sensitive traffic signals.

- Provide accommodation for casual/novice bicyclists on a selected route network. Design features include dedicated bicycle/pedestrian trails and marked bike lanes.
- Establish education and enforcement programs for bicyclists and motorists which teaches responsible shared-use roadway behavior.
- Establish maintenance practices which keep bikeways in a generally clean and smooth condition.

As required by ISTEA, the longrange plan must be finished by the end of 1994. It will be used regularly by Peoria-area engineers to plan transportation projects and set funding priorities. Writing bicycles into planning and design references means fewer advocacy struggles in the future. Transportation folks call this "institutionalizing" bicycle planning.


\*Intermodal Surface Transportation Efficiency Act. Federal law signed by President Bush. Among other things, it provides for increased citizen involvement in transportation issues.

CITY COUNCIL VOTES TO CLOSE LEHMAN ROAD. On November 22, the Peoria City Council voted 8–3 to close Lehman Road at Flint Street, at least temporarily. The council directed city staff to monitor the effect of the closure for up to nine months and to prepare a report after that. City engineer Jim Bauman has told me that bicycle, pedestrian and handicapped access will continue through the blockaded intersection. —Eric Hutchison

If all goes to plan, by the time the December newsletter hits your



# At the CABDA Dealer Show, Nov. 4–6

With approximately a zillion display booths, the CABDA dealer show at the Rosemont Convention Center is tough to get through in a day. Here are just a few of the products you may see when CABDA opens its Consumer Bike Show at the same location in February.


Shimano shoes no longer support the three-hole Look cleat. All shoes on display were drilled only for Shimano's proprietary SPD pedals. Following Sachs lead, Shimano also displayed the Inter-7, a new internally geared 7-speed hub. The new hub—aimed at what Shimano hopes is a growing army of utilitarian bicycles—is available with a coaster or cable-actuated brake. Union USA showed off its extensive line of spokes, including their most colorful




The most exciting **Schwinn** of the 90s may turn out to be the recently reissued Black Phantom with locking springer fork, whitewalls and acres of glorious chrome.

assortment ever—TiDye titanium spokes, weighing in at 120 grams per set of 32 in "typical mountain bike length." Look for them at the next Grateful Dead concert in your area. The sixth edition of Sutherland's Handbook, the bible of bicycle mechanics everywhere, is due out soon. And many well-read mechanics will also pop for a copy of Sutherland's Handbook of Coaster Brakes and Internally Geared Hubs. Sachs

displayed the Hydro-Pull, a sealed hydraulic "power booster" system available as a retrofit compatible with all cantilever and drum brake systems. Kryptonite, on a high from favorable magazine reviews of its U.S.-made New York Lock, passed out posters of the Statue of Liberty holding a bright red U-Lock instead of a torch. Kryptonite was confident enough of the new lock that it reinstated its \$1,000 guarantee in Manhattan, evidently the bastion of the



Cyclists can enjoy the performance of standard bicycles and the compact storage of folding bikes. **S and S Machine** displayed road, mountain and tandem bicycles equipped with its lightweight (226g) Bicycle Torque Coupling System. The stainless steel couplers—available installed on frames from Richard Sachs, Salsa, J.P. Weigle and others—add approximately \$300 to the retail cost of the bike, and allow a 64cm or smaller bike to fit within a 26" x 26' x 10" case.



Dia-Compe attracted attention with its Tsali SRC Rear Cassette Hub. The SRC stands for silent roller clutch. The design eliminates the clicking sound of a coasting rear wheel. Currently aimed at the mountain bike set, the Tsali SRC may evolve into a beefed-up tandem hub in late '95 or early '96.

world's most accomplished bicycle thieves. Rock Shox had the coolest product catalog at the show. Besides being big at 11" x 17", the "Judy" book was filled with intriguing pictures, not the least of which was a stuffed Gumby riding somebody's back baskets with the caption, "Quit Your Job." Crestone displayed mountain bikes with "Super Active Suspension" (SAS) with 4.5" front travel and 3.5" rear travel. The most important part of the SAS system resembles those flat

rubber straps that are used to tie down luggage to roof racks. Oddities at the show included Powersports, a company dedicated to the pursuit of attaching 21cc gas engines to bicycles, scooters and skateboards. Really. Natalia Florence Cycle Corp. showed off a surprisingly affordable three-wheeled recumbent featuring an aluminum frame, rear disc brakes, rear steer and front wheel drive. Estimated retail: below \$900. AC International claimed its Cool Bottle with patented IceCore (similar to the blue thingies you stick in an ice chest) keeps beverages 30% colder than standard bottles for up to two hours. Of course AC also claims that its new "Ice-Age" technology adds no weight to a full bottle. Check, please.

THREE YEARS AGO, a small group of bicyclists held a meeting to discuss the need for an organized voice for bicyclists in the State of Illinois. The result of the meeting was the formation of the League of Illinois Bicyclists (LIB).

LIB-trained bicycle advocates have brought the needs of bicyclists to the attention of government officials at local, regional and state levels. Tangible results of the LIB working for you include:

- · Cross-town bike route plans for Peoria.
- Bicyclists' input included in Secretary of State safety brochure.
- · Bike bans overturned in Park Forest.
- Millions of dollars of federal ISTEA funds awarded for bicycle projects.
- Public officials asking bicyclists to help with ISTEA-mandated bicycle planning.

All of this, and more, was accomplished with a very meager operating budget and many hours of volunteer time from your peers.

Currently, none of your League of American Bicyclists dues go to support LIB. We are funded entirely from donations and grants. Therefore, I'm asking for your support to help LIB expand its agenda and programs.



GRAY MARKET GOODS. According to a phone representative for Vittoria North America, Vittoria tires sold through mail order firms don't pass through Vittoria's U.S. distribution channel. Instead, the tires are imported through third-party Europeans and may be up to five years old at time of purchase. One IVW member found this out the hard way when the tread peeled away from the

casing of his "brand new" tubulars. The good news? The American distributor still honors warranty problems. Vittoria North America, 1639 W. Sheridan Ave., Oklahoma City, OK 73106, (405) 239-2677.

LATE NEWS. According to a May 1994 publication from the City of Peoria, 500 bicycle safety strips were installed on storm sewer inlets during 1993.

BUS RACKS. According to a news release from Washington State-based Sportworks NW, Inc., Seattle Metro has chosen the company to install front bumper-mounted bike racks on nearly 1,250 buses. An article in the *Journal American* says that transit officials hope the racks, paid for with a \$950,000 federal grant, will increase ridership.

Each rack carries up to two bikes (bikes are carried free). Sportworks claims that even people who have never seen the rack before can load and unload their bikes in less than 30 seconds. A single support arm holds the bicycle in the rack's wheel wells, and the rack touches nothing but the rubber tires to avoid damage. Sportworks, 15500 Wood-Red Rd. NE #C-600, Woodinville, WA 98072, (206) 483-7000.


