

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Landmark Lands On The Mark

Well, for those who ride Grange Hall Road on the west side of the river, this is a big deal. For years we've been speculating how much longer that poor ol' barn out there by the gravel pits was going to last. On the 16th, I took the afternoon off, and favorite stoker and I rode out to the start point of this year's

No Baloney Ride. Sure enough it was collapsed—the barn. And guess what—the car was still in it, looking much the worse for the experience!

A big thanks to Roger John for organizing the bus trip to the CABDA show and North Pier bike museum, et.al. The bus was full, the hospitality was great—Roger's still eating donuts—and we met some kindred souls from the Bloomington club.

We had a board meeting as is customary this month. We've had a great victory in the advocacy area. The bike map/plan for the City of Peoria went thru its time in the council meeting as a non-controversial issue. So what's the big deal? Without a great deal of effort and persistence on Eric Hutchison's part, the outcome would probably have been very different. Many items that get to the council floor are already decided well in advance.

As you'll see, we have a good looking ride schedule for April. We'll have up to three groups on the Wright ride, so we can truly fit the needs of all levels of riders on Tuesday evenings. Encourage those new riders and their cross bikes or fat tires or whatever to come out.

Sheryl Hansen is looking for a few dozen good volunteers for the No Baloney Ride. The idea is to keep day-ofride shifts short to permit all to ride at

least 50 miles. It looks like Jubilee Park is going to be an excellent start point with none of the distractions we've had at Wildlife Prairie Park.

The board voted favorably on our financial split on the Interplanetary ride. In a nutshell: We will get 25% of the net and will not be required to put up any money in advance of the ride. Our help will be in the areas of

organization, routes, and logistics. We will need a few day of ride volunteers. I'm hoping we can provide some on-the-job training to Lakeview and Peoria Academy of Sciences folks during the No Baloney Ride.

The weather's getting better all the time, Daylight Savings Time is nearly upon us, and I have a healthy stoker. It's going to be a great season!

Peoria bike plan passes unanimously

ON MARCH 7, the Peoria City Council approved the bicycle map/plan created by the Traffic Engineering Department with substantial IVW input. This vote authorizes the department to spend \$10,000 on bicycle accommodations in 1995. Furthermore, it gives tentative approval to the same yearly expenditure in '96 and '97.

I spoke at the council meeting in support of the plan and its positive impact on the quality of life in Peoria neighborhoods. This got the attention of a few folks in the audience; after the meeting, I met Annette Hoerdeman from the Moss-Bradley Residential Association. Annette told me that bicycles are "good traffic," and that Peoria neighborhoods

would welcome them. Sounds like neighborhood association meetings would be an excellent forum to publicize and promote the bicycle plan—stay tuned.

Peoria *Journal Star* reporter Doug Fruehling covered the hearing with a feature article about the bicycle plan/map.

STATE BICYCLE PROFESSIONAL REPORTS STRONG DEMAND FOR ILLINOIS BICYCLE MAPS. In the first two months of availability, 8,000 copies of the first Illinois State Bicycle Map have already been distributed. On March 15 in East Peoria, Craig Williams, Illinois Bicycle/Pedestrian Program Manager, and Mark Wenneborg, Bicycle Resource Specialist with the Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT), discussed the state's bicycle map program with the

Technical Committee of the Tri-County Regional Planning Commission (TCRPC). Craig reported to the area transportation engineers that the state maps give a bicycle-suitability rating to all regional and county roads in the state. This will allow central Illinois bicyclists to find, for example, a bicycle route between Peoria and Galesburg. The state maps do not give

great detail in larger urban areas such as Peoria, which emphasizes the need for a detailed Peoria-area map to compliment the state publication. Jim Baumann, Peoria Traffic Engineering, asked Craig for contacts at Northern Illinois University—where cartography work on the state maps is ongoing—to assist in preparation of Peoria's map.

Tazewell County Engineer Norm Johansen reported at the meeting that a number of roads in his district, such as the Washington/Metamora blacktop, had recently been reconstructed with paved shoulders. Norm said this serves a dual use—more load-carrying capability for trucks and more space for bicycles. Craig Williams pointed out that state and federal funding is available for on-road bicycle projects including paved shoulders, but that few local governments have thus far requested funding; instead, most requests are focused on trails.

ILLINOIS BICYCLE RESOURCE GUIDE AVAILABLE. At the same time you're requesting a state bicycle map for IDOT, I'd also suggest you request the booklet Bicycle Resources—A Source

Guide for Maps, Brochures and Bicycle Groups in Illinois. This IDOT publication is a great guide to printed and on-line bicycle information in Illinois and nationwide.

NATIONAL POLICE ON BIKES CONFERENCE COMES MIDWEST-IVW offers to sponsor local officers. The first Midwestern Police on Bikes conference in three years will be held May 4-6 in Milwaukee, WI. In preparation, I send conference brochures to local officers in charge of POB programs, Lieutenant Jeff Konvalinka (Peoria County Sheriff's Department) and Lieutenant Jim Graham (Peoria Police Department). Furthermore, I extended an offer to pay the registration costs for one officer from each group on behalf of the IVW (this comes from a private donation, not the club treasury). A POB program is good for cyclists in at least three ways:

- It helps local government recognize the bicycle as a serious vehicle.
- Bicycle-mounted police, like cyclists in general, require good roads and trails.
- Abusive motorists are likely to think twice when they realize that some bicyclists are also police officers.

LIB/LAB MEMBERSHIP OFFER TO IVW MEMBERS. So is that a longenough acronym for you? Inside this newsletter, you'll find a membership flyer from the League of Illinois Bicyclists. When you join LIB, you also automatically become a member of the League of American Bicyclists-two memberships for the price of one. I urge you to join LIB/LAB. Effective advocacy means communication at all levels of government. LIB gives us a vital voice with state officials. LAB does the same thing at the federal level. The need for such wide-ranging advocacy was underlined during the Forrest Hill/Gale debate-it was avenues transportation officials who opened the ears of local government to Peoria-area bicyclists on this critical project.

Seen at the Midwest Bicycle Show...

TANDEM MAN. When Greg Shepherd isn't involved in the production, distribution or promotion of *Tandem Magazine*, he runs a 23-site network of 5,000 computers for the Springfield (OR) public schools.

He rides to and from work, at lunch, and often, with his son. It's undeniably a busy life. "I come home from work—if I ride home with my son, great, if I don't I spend the evening playing with him 'til he's in bed—then I'm off to the barn until 12, 2 in the morning working on the magazine."

Greg's not kidding about the barn. "Most people look at this four-color slick and think we're some big publishing conglomerate. We've got a barn converted to an office upstairs—kick the pig out of the way on the way up—a pretty laid-back environment."

Despite its humble abode, the magazine is growing rapidly. When the first issue was published in the summer of 1994, *Tandem* had 1,000 subscribers on board. Two issues later, Greg printed 40,000 copies of the spring '95 issue. (In contrast, *Bicycling* prints about 125,000 copies each issue.) In addition, *Tandem* has gathered national exposure in publications like Newsweek.

Greg credits yesterday's die-hard single-bike riders for today's burgeoning tandem market.

"They say the tandem is the great equalizer in that couples of different abilities can ride together," says

Greg. "The same thing is true for families. My fouryear-old son Arnie pulls his weight back there. Before. when he was in the trailer, it was, in the summer. 'Ah, this is goin' on too long, Dad-I want to head back.'




Now it's 'Where's that road go?'"

Now, where should I POINT THE CAMERA? Last year at the bicycle show, East Coast aerospace manufacturer Dan/Ed displayed a lightweight bicycle crank. One item, one picture. This year, Dan/Ed was back, packing more innovation into one, still tiny, booth than anyone else at the show.

The guide to exhibitors only gave a hint of what



show-goers would see: "Belt Drive Bicycles." And this product, by itself, was worth an entire display. Kevlar-reinforced, the slim timing belt—not unlike that found in a car engine—weighed just 65 grams.

Besides the toothed belt, new headset, and single-sided chainstay and fork designs, the Dan/Ed road-going beam bike (left) was especially striking. At the heart of the machine is an internal transmission featuring 16 evenly spaced gears ranging from a low roughly equivalent to a 39x27 to a high just above a 53x11. Dan/Ed claims the company could easily create 20- and 25-speed units based on the same design. Already in production, the transmission is being offered in steel or aluminum housings to framebuilders.

Dan/Ed's mountain bike features a unique elastomer rear suspension. The pivot is concentric with the crank spindle, creating—as far as the derailleurs are concerned—a clean unified suspension, without the additional complexity—or royalty considerations—of other unified designs. The company claims nearly six inches of travel at the rear wheel.

Small wonder that people at the earlier Philidelphia Interbike show were saying, "Wow, too many new ideas." What a time to run out of film.

The tandem (shown in case) takes up only a little more space, and Kate was quick to mention that the double had recently won Popular Mechanic's Design and Engineering Award. (PM said that while some



new bicycles are interesting from an evolutionary perspective, Montague Corporation was creating "truly revolutionary" products.)

AUTHOR, AUTHOR. "I'm primarily a road biker, not a competitive cyclist, definitely a touring cyclist," says Karen Gentry, author of Cycling Michigan, 25 of the Best Routes in Western Michigan.

About 6,500 copies of her book have been distributed through Midwest bike shops and outdoor stores; she was at the Midwest Bicycle Show promoting her newest book—on cycling in eastern Michigan—which is due to be published this month.

Off the bike, Karen works as an information specialist for Kent County (Grand Rapids), and fills whatever spare time she has left as a freelance writer. Her books are filled with detail, whether commentary on the best places to eat, or tidbits of local history.


