hen Dutch cyclists Ivo Sweens and Tom Verhoeven started their transcontinental trip on Easter Sunday, they weren't worried about mountains or dogs or prevailing winds. They were worried about crossing the Queensboro Bridge in New York. Tom said to a newspaper reporter, "It was forbidden for bicycles, but we had no choice."

Ironically, they both later agreed that the state of New York offered the most beautiful scenery during the first part of their trip.

They also agreed that Ohio and Indiana had noticeably poorer roads than New York. "Roads are very bad," Tom said. "Repairs everywhere. Very bad for the wheels."

Both Ivo, the nephew of Rome, IL, resident Don Scranton, and Tom replaced several broken spokes before reaching the



Peoria area 1,140 miles and three weeks later. But repairs didn't slow the pair down. The pair cycled 146 miles in a one day to reach Rome from the Indiana border.

Their journey had been well planned. They knew before they started that the wind blew from west to east, yet they decided to travel against the prevailing wind. Tom, flipping through a Rand McNally atlas said, "If you start in San Francisco you see the national parks of California, the Rocky Mountains, the Grand Canyon, but as you move east . . ." He waved his arm over the emptiness of the mid-continent.

By traveling east to west, they simply hoped to save the best for last.

The enthusiasm of

Three weeks later, on their way to San Francisco, they rested three days while visiting Ivo's uncle, Don Scranton, of Rome, IL.

Americans for their journey surprised the pair. It would be highly unusual in Holland for a couple of cyclists to be quizzed about their ride. Coming from a cycling nation, Tom was unused to answering questions that American cyclists take for granted, like "Where are you from?" "Where are you going?" and especially this year, "Rainy enough for you?"

Ivo said that many people in Holland plan transcontinental trips across the United States using bicycles, motorcycles or cars. In comparison, riding through Europe is a decidedly domestic and uneventful pursuit. Ivo's aunt, Dutch-born Corrie Scranton, agreed.

"There they go to Greece like we go to the grocery store."

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Cycling for Change—It Pays!

Reprinted from the April issue of Chicagoland Bicycle Federation News

I often tell people how much money you can save by bicycling. I've never found a good data source to cite how much you can make, though, so I've started keeping track of the money I find on the side of the road.

In February and March, I netted \$1.62. It's not big bucks, but it buys a little chocolate now and then. Mostly, I pick up quarters and dimes, but sometimes I find singles or five-spots. I stop for pennies and nickels only when there's lots of 'em. It takes me 15 seconds to stop and pick up a dime, so I figure I'm making \$24 an hour. Quarters and bills raise that average. "Keep your eyes on the road" takes on a whole new

meaning—but please don't lose sight of that dictum's original message.

I've found lots more than cash, too. Drivers drop everything—tools, gloves, scarves, jewelry, wallets. Wallets with ID are a pain—reuniting them with their owners takes time. Everything that's unidentifiable and unreturnable compensates for times when the stuff's inattentive former owners offer their doors to me.

I'd like to hear from other roadside gleaners, to get a better idea of the full value of this largely hidden benefit of cycling. It may not be enough to get most people to shift to bicycling, but it's not

Other People, Other Places

Members of the Jacksonville Bicycle Club don't merely curse contentious curs, they rate them on a 1-to-10 scale. In the club's spring newsletter, a local dalmatian and companion were rated 9.0 on speed ("These dogs can run"), and 10 on teamwork ("excellent use of buddy system"). The author contends that Jacksonville dogs are especially fond of cyclists and that "The prospect of a spinning cyclist anywhere near their little patch of Ipava has tails thumping the porch all over greater Morgan County."

Each year, members clean up part of Old Highway 61 north of the city. The May newsletter points out an added benefit to trash pickup: "You can keep anything you find!"

Also noted in the QCBC newsletter: "The QCBC has 36 various activities listed in the ride schedule for May. May has 31 days. It should be longer!"

IVW funds police education, fixes bikes

IVW DONATES POB REGISTRATION TO PEORIA COUNTY. On May 4-6, two officers from Peoria County's Police



on Bikes (POB) Patrol attended the National POB conference in Milwaukee. A private donor presented the registration fees to the Peoria County Sheriff's Department on behalf of the club.

Community benefits of Police on Bicycle patrols include:

- Cost effectiveness. Up to 15 bike officers can be outfitted for the cost of one patrol car.
- The "stealth" advantage. Because they man silent vehicles, officers on bikes
 - can ride up to the scene of a crime before they are noticed.
- Recognition by the police of road & trail improvements needed to enhance safe bicycle use for all road/trail users.

After the Milwaukee conference, Captain Needham of the Sheriff's department, wrote the club. "Thanks again for giving two of the Sheriff's deputies the opportunity to attend the National Police on Bikes Conference . . . They would not have been able to attend if it was not for [the IVW's] help.

In addition to the two gentlemen from

Peoria, the conference attracted over four hundred officers, some from as far away as Hawaii, Canada and Australia.

IVW REPAIRS BIKES FOR KIDS. On May 20, the IVW helped repair hundreds of bicycles donated to the Salvation Army

for needy children. Peorians who donated bikes received gift certificates from Sheridan Village merchants. Bike repairs were coordinated by Illinois Cycle and Fitness. Thanks to everyone who helped out (watch for your names to be mentioned in the next newsletter.)

BETTER BIKE ACCESS COMING TO MAIN ST? THE IVW SUGGESTS TRAFFIC CALMING. Peoria's West Main Street may be in for a facelift favorable to both cyclists and pedestrians in the next few years. According to Jim Martin, Peoria city planner, a more people-friendly transportation system is part of a neighborhood improvement plan being developed by business owners and homeowners in the West Main St./Bradley University area. Objectives of the plan include reducing motor traffic speed and

improving non-motorized access to businesses on Main Street—somewhat like the Prospect Avenue shopping area in downtown Peoria Heights.

NOTE: Better bicycle/pedestrian access for Main Street was requested by business owners without prompting from the IVW. The city's planning staff is exploring a "back-door" plan using low-traffic side streets to provide bike access to businesses while making Main Street five lanes wide. Blocking off intersecting streets to reduce motor traffic volume and create parking in neighborhoods is also under study.

At a recent meeting of the Peoria Traffic Commission, Peoria County Engineer Dale Page suggested making Main Street a 3-lane road (including center turn-lane) to create space for wide outside bicycle lanes and improved sidewalks for pedestrians. I seconded Mr. Pages's comments and sent the city staff a design manual that describes "traffic calming" techniques. (Case study #19 from the National Bicycling and Walking Study, Federal Highways Administration.)

IVW MEMBER FRANNY KLEES did a debut bicycle commute to her job on National Bike to Work Day (May 16). She reported feeling great & found that the trip took about the same time as driving the car


Tuesday, May 9 Okay, so Bill gets a little worried about some flimsy excuse of a tornado warning and calls off the ride. Just this once, Bill.
