For the third year in a row, Bill Clark has made Diane's Ride possible. This year, 171 riders enjoyed the best of Central Illinois cycling while the club cleared over \$1,000. Besides running the whole show, Bill Clark also provided the personal touch. One participant rode to the start in Glasford from Bradley University. When heat and mileage took their toll, Bill gave the lonely adventurer a ride back to Peoria before finally retiring to his Pekin home.

The Weather was perfect. If you are accustomed to riding in the desert. It was a balmy 92 degrees and the humidity was about the same. But that didn't stop 171 riders from showing up and spending the day pedaling over the country roads of rural Peoria and Fulton counties. Diane's Ride '95. This was a record-setting year for us. 

# Beam me up now, Sheldon

HIS PAST JULY, 160 riders went where "no cyclists had gone before," where only unmanned space probes had visited. Of the group, thirty riders even went beyond the limits

of the most ambitious robot explorers-to the edge of the solar system. The ride, course, was the Interplanetary Bicycle Ride, the first event of its kind in the Solar System.

Judging by the enthusiastic response of the riders, the event was a tremendous success, despite the 96-degree heat, with over 110 riders Saturday and 80 Sunday, including 46 walk-ons. Since the

Saturday ride started half a billion miles from the Sun, near the planet Jupiter (CILCO's Pioneer Park facility), we expected frigid deep space temperatures, but as we found out many times that day. astronomers don't know everything about space near Peoria.


The ride was a collaborative venture of the Wheelm'n, Lakeview Museum of Arts and Sciences, the Peoria Astronomical Society, and the Peoria Academy of Sciences, so credit needs to be given to the numerous volunteers from each of these groups.

Rest stops at Uranus and Pluto were staffed by members of the Astronomical

Society, who also provided safe viewing of our nearest star in addition the refueling the many space vehicles which docked in planetary orbit.

The Geology Section of the Peoria

Academy of Science staffed dessert breads?



The Audubon and Botany Sections provided fuel and a parking orbit around Neptune, and were the aphelion point for most orbits that day.

George Dudley was my liaison with the Wheelm'n, and, in addition to coordinating route mapping and marking, worked closely with me on the "billions and billions" of details that go with an invitational ride!

The ride's sponsors also deserve a great round of applause. Terry Beachler of Beachler's Amoco donated a \$5.00 car wash coupon to each participant. State Farm Insurance donated copies of the Rand McNally Road Atlas. Phil and Mary Good (Good's Furniture) provided root beer floats to everyone making it to Pluto (by bike or car-14 billion miles is a bit far, and no, it wasn't cold at Pluto either).

WMBD-AM 1470 and WMXP 93.3 FM provided generous air time promoting the event. Russell's Cycling & Fitness provided repair service along the trail (I saw them fixing several flats, one just a few million miles from Jupiter but I promised I wouldn't tell whose). Bradley University donated logo pencils plus food and staff for the Sunday Jupiter rest area (did anyone notice that there were two Jupiters? Planet cloning no doubt).

Finally, Illinois Central College donated food and staff for the Saturn rest stop, a stop that looked like the start of a buffet line-they must have known that WHOI (Channel 19) was going to show up and interview the participants.

Word about this first-year ride hasn't traveled farther than the "outer limits" of the Solar System (all but one rider from Illinois). Those to whom I talked planned to return next year, saying that Peoria has some of the greatest rides in the region.

We're already looking at dates for next year, and are considering July 27, 28. If anyone has any feedback concerning the date, positive or negative, please let me know before we set it in stone.

### Education at speed, conference in Madison

HEARD IT ON THE PACE LINE GRAPEVINE. According to regular participant Dave Hansen, Steve Shaffer's Wednesday night

"Thrills, Skills & Speed" ride has been a real success story. Steve initiated this weekly IVW ride this year to help teach endurance, speed and bike handling skills which he learned at Walden's School of Cycling. The group regularly practices paceline and breakaway/chasing techniques. Steve has also emphasized on-

road safety—such as riding single-file when traffic dictates.

Due to training received in Steve's ride, some regulars have begun to compete in local events such as triathlons. Dave, who has also done fast-paced training rides with Chicago-area clubs, reports that Thrills, Skills & Speed is "one of the best rides I've been on in the last two to three years." —Eric Hutchison

BIKE ACTION 2000 CONFERENCE. I picked up some great tips at a September 16–17 advocacy conference held in bike-friendly Madison, WI. And some great statistics like these:

- The average freeway (such as the proposed Peoria/Chicago highway) costs \$2 million per mile to build. A bike lane costs one-tenth this amount (\$200,000 per mile).
- The average car-parking space costs \$30,000. A completely-enclosed deluxe bicycle parking locker costs about \$300.

The conference included a bicycle tour of Madison's cycling facilities. One highlight was University Street, which is

> a lot like Peoria's University Avenue in that both roads carry about 20,000 to 30,000 cars per day. The Madison version, however, comes equipped with bicycle lanes which attract up to 7,000 cyclists daily.

Tipped helmets to the Bicycle Federation of America, the League of American Bicyclists and the Rails To Trails Conservancy for a

first-rate weekend. —Eric Hutchison

STATE TRANSPORTATION DEPARTMENT BICYCLE POLICY. August 1, 1995, may be remembered as a red-letter day for Illinois bicyclists. The Policies and Procedures For Accommodating Bicycles in Highway Improvements went into effect that day. The policies require that on-road bicycle travel be accommodated in state highway improvement projects where bicycle travel is expected, except where bicycling is prohibited, where the project is resurfacing only, or where the design has already been approved.

The League of Illinois Bicyclists is among the organizations to be consulted by the state on bicycle travel. Too bad this policy applies only to state highways, and not county highways, township roads or municipal streets and roads. Maybe someday.

THE FIRST MEETING OF THE SAFETY EDUCATION SUBCOMMITTEE of the Interagencies Bikeways Council met on August 29 in Springfield. The most significant item was that Bob Young of the IDOT Safety Programs Bureau agreed to survey all state agencies in order to compile an inventory of bicycle safety materials and services. This should be a useful step toward coordination of these programs.

The League of Illinois Bicyclists (LIB) contributed information on Wisconsin and Florida programs and a list of bicycle safety education resource people around the U.S., compiled by Barbara Sturges. We noted that several states spend hundreds of thousands of dollars annually on bicycle safety. Many of these programs "train the trainer," rather than going directly to the public.

Sgt. Terry Winson of the State Police, reported that copies of "The Law is For All," a video promoting the importance of enforcing the law for bicyclists, is being distributed to police units.


Jim Churchill, of the Board of Education, discussed the importance of bringing back materials from safety conferences for distribution in Illinois.

The meeting was chaired by Illinois Bicycle/Pedestrian Coordinator Craig Williams. Mark Wenneborg, Williams' associate, and Janine Toman of the Secretary of State's office, also attended.

The next meeting is scheduled for October 3. —Al Sturges

long haul from Kathmandu, to answer the second part of the question first.


Betty is a medical doctor and Donn is a university professor. They're giving of themselves in the missionary field for the Navigators. They've had two articles


As it happens, both Tresses are from the Indy area, so it was fun to be with them for the ice cream ride at the velodrome. They knew where to eat in the area and how to get around.

### Illinois History Weekend Ride

EY, IT'S NOT WINTER YET. Don't let your summer mileage lapse into mediocrity. You don't have to drive 100 miles to ride a weekend ride and pay an arm and a leg and a seat.

Intrepid IVW riders and anybody else can join me on two ?-plus-mile days from Jubilee Park to the Hansen's 1862 centennial Prairie Farm on Saturday, October 7, and return on Sunday, October 8.

Here's the preliminary route plan:

#### SATURDAY, OCTOBER 7:

Leave Jubilee Park at 8:30 a.m.

Ride last year's route through Princeville, Toulon and Galva, with a snack/lunch stop at Bishop Hill, a restored Swedish commune.

Visit the craft shops, blacksmith shop, restored church/meeting hall, old blockhouse living quarters, basket shop, spinning wheel exhibit, art museum or, just hang out and relax.

Go back south to Prairie Farm (an experimental B&B).

There are two showers, two double-bed bedrooms, one bedroom with two twin beds and one cot to be set up anywhere. Sleeping bags and/or couches should hold the leftovers.

For you pioneer spirits, there is plenty of tent space outside (coyote yelps, owl hoots and raccoon skirmishes are added attractions.) We have even caught glimpses of a prairie chicken (rare) and deer in the early morning hours.

Sunset barbecue chicken dinner provided by the LaFayette Methodist Church.

Any sag stuff (sleeping bags, tents, etc.) must get to Sheryl the week before.

#### SUNDAY, OCTOBER 8:

Return via Victoria (Route 167), then south to Oak Run Lake for eats at the restaurant, or a brief stop at the Amoco station in Williamsfield (whatever).

Head for Jubilee Park via Laura and Brimfield/Jubilee roads.

#### Fee:

\$20—You'll never find a more reasonable weekend ride. Proceeds will be donated to the LaFayette Methodist Church building fund for their new kitchen and Sunday School.

#### NOTE:

Make sure your bike and tires/tubes are in good riding condition. There will be no sag service (unless someone can be arm-twisted into doing it). Also, there are no official rest stops. We will stop enough to eat and resupply.

Ride at an enjoyable, relaxing pace (tandems welcome if you can manage that). Preregistrations appreciated but not required. Call Sheryl Hansen at 263-2870 or 766-0406.

In my years of riding, I've noticed that no matter how adverse the conditions, roadside weeds thrive. How can we stay ahead of the weeds? And, where did they come from anyway?

First, the only way for cyclists to stay ahead of weeds is to keep moving. While weeds, unlike dogs, don't actually chase cyclists, I suppose that if one remained stationary long enough, tiny but tough tendrils would eventually reach the feet and go on to engulf the entire rider. Seems a tad unlikely, but heh, so does the idea of objective journalism.




