

Wheeling in the New Year...

PEORIA BIKE MAP NEWS The city has received quotes from several map-makers to produce its first city bicycle map. Target publication date for the finished map is January 15, 1996. I will be working closely with Traffic Engineer Al Schneider in the next few weeks to finalize map details. Besides identifying the most "bicycle-friendly" city streets, the map should encourage more folks to try cycling in the city. Toward this goal, I'm preparing a list of fun destinationsparks, historic sites and shopping areasto include on the map. I'd also like to help new bikers reach their destinations smiling, so I'll include some safe-cycling tips.

RIVERFRONT, HISTORIC CEMETERY
LINKED. Peoria's first bicycle lane* was
recently painted on Abington Street
between Glen Oak Park and Adams
Street. Also, a paved and lighted trail was
added linking the southern entrance of
Springdale Cemetery with Abington
Street (at the base of Glen Oak Park). This
project completes the link between
Peoria's historic cemetery and the river-

front recreational areas. It is part of a larger Peoria Park District/city plan to link the Rock Island Trail with the riverfront. On the northern end, trail users can travel from Toulon to Peoria's Pioneer Parkway (by K's Merchandise). The "missing link," from Springdale Cemetery to Pioneer Parkway, is probably a year or more away—rights to the existing rail road are under negotiation.

The new trail & bike lanes are impressive, and destined to raise cycling awareness within the city. Improved sidewalks & cross walks at the Adams/Abington intersection are also a plus. My main concern is the safety of the road/trail intersection at the foot of Glen Oak Park (Abington Street). From my saddle, it looks like complexity added to an already complex four-way intersection. Signs and/or pavement markings to direct trail users through the road/trail transition will probably be needed.

ENGINEERING DEPARTMENT PROPOSES BICYCLE FACILITY IMPROVEMENTS.

Peoria's Traffic Engineering Department has proposed \$278,000 of bicycle facility improvements for the next 5-year Capital Improvement Program (CIP). The city council will weigh this proposal as part of its budget debate this month. Prepare your dialing finger—we may be doing a quick-strike phone tree of support to council members as part of this process. Potential projects qualifying for this money include:

- Olympia Drive./Rock Island Trail link (connect the trail with Detweiller Park and north Peoria residences via secondary roadway network in Pioneer Park)
- Meadowbrook Road widening (between Brandywine Drive and Dries Lane)
- University/Lake St (bicycle sensitize the traffic signal).
- Bradley U./Uplands connection (improved bike/ped crossing of Main St near upper Bradley Park.)

IVW ADVOCACY GOALS FOR '96:

- Peoria bike map—published and on the shelves.
- Pekin bike map/plan—IVW plan created passed to City of Pekin for adoption.
- Peoria bike map/plan—promotional event to publicize the new map & raise public awareness of cycling issues.
 Possibilities- City-sponsored bike-to-work day/week. IVW-guided bike tour of Peoria's parks and historic sites (joint effort with Peoria Historical Society).
- Initiate safe cycling education—IVW to bring the League of American Bicyclists' revised Effective Cycling program to the Peoria area.
- Peoria city council/mayoral elections—
 make bicycle-access an election issue.
 Propose establishing a city bike/pedestrian
 planning position on the city staff.

Society has asked the IVW for some guidance to help teach bike safety and helmet awareness at an April 27 event. I see this as a great opportunity to:

- Help some kids become better cyclists
- Help educate parents about the importance of preventive medicine (bike safety skills) as opposed to simply mandating helmet use.
- Promote a positive public image for cyclists and the IVW.

John Bousky of Illinois Cycling and Fitness has agreed to do bike-safety inspections. Helmets for children in need may also be donated. Other organizations involved include the Peoria County Sheriff's Department and the Peoria Park District. Thus far, I've agreed to send Ms. Meyers some bike safety reference material. I see the IVW helping plan the message of this event while relying on other organizations for day-of-event volunteers. Call me at 685-3921 if you'd like to be involved.

FREE BIKE SAFETY PLATES. Bicycles bring out the nicest folks. While doing some preliminary "in-the-saddle" research for a Pekin bike map, I met Pat Olson—the Tazewell County Recorder of Deeds. Mrs Olson gave me a reflective-plastic triangle plate she's been distributing to young local riders to improve visibility

and safety. They are available free courtesy of the Tazewell County Sheriff's Department. If you would like more info, contact Mrs Olson at 477-2210.

BICYCLING GETS BURMA-SHAVE BOOST. The North Prospect Area Neighbors Association has put a new twist on an old idea to improve the bicycle/pedestrian friendliness of their scenic bluff-top neighborhood. The group posted sequential signs along Peoria's Prospect Avenue encouraging motorists to use alternative routes for through-travel. The signs read "In a hurry?/Use War Drive to Knoxville/Cut drive time up to 30%." The association's statistics are supported by a professional traffic study which dispels the myth that Prospect is a shortcut through Peoria's northside. Association members hope to "free up space on the road for bicyclists who have more time to enjoy the scenery" according to a recent Journal Star story.

Lots of neighborhoods are clamoring for reduced motorist traffic; some have gone to extremes (Lehman Road blockade). Tipped helmets to the Prospect group for a more constructive solution, helping motorists save their most precious resource: driving time.

PEKIN BIKE PLAN. This winter, I plan to gather the ideas of Pekin-area cyclists to create a bike map/plan for that city. We've got a good start already-new IVW president and Pekin resident Bill Clark has established friendly contact with Pekin's Director of Public Works Dennis Keif. Eventually, the Pekin bike map (along with Peoria, East Peoria, Washington, Morton . . .) could become part of a single bike map covering the greater Peoria area. In coming months, I'll be asking Pekinarea IVW members about the routes they normally use for cycling. The input will be merged to form a single map of suggested city routes plus a list of potential improvement projects. Call me at 685-3921 if you'd like to be involved.

PROGRESS IN PEKIN:

- Court Street/IL 29 bypass. At a
 October 10 public information meeting, ten IVW members suggested the proposed Pekin southern bypass be built in a manner which improves bicycle access. IVW member and Pekin resident Leonard Bobbitt expressed his support for better cycling during an interview by the Pekin Times during its coverage of the meeting.
- Route 98 (Edgewater Dr). The Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT) has plans to upgrade this road between

Route 29 and Parkway Dr., including 8foot paved shoulders. With a bit of encouragement, perhaps the project could be extended further east—providing bicycle access to McNaughton Park.

 Route 24 (Pekin/Bartonville) IDOT is now resurfacing this route north of the Route 9 bridge. There is a major-league project waiting in the wings for this road which will include widening and paved shoulders. Friendly interest from organized cyclists can help turn these plans into pavement more quickly.
