According to a recent article in "Parade" magazine, the number two activity (swimming is number one) participated in by all U.S. citizens for exercise and recreation is Bicycling. Now that the Spring/Summer bicycling season is fast approaching, please help save some lives and prevent accidents by passing on the following to your readers:

- (1) According to U.S. Government statistics, 75% of all deaths and serious head injuries due to bicycle accidents could be prevented by wearing a <u>hard-shell</u> bicycle <u>helmet</u>:
- (2) These statistics also show that the <u>major</u> causes of bicycle accidents are as follows (in descending order):
 - (A) "Wrong-way" bicycle riding, that is, on the <u>left</u> side of the road, opposing the traffic flow.
 - (B) Not stopping at stop signs or traffic lights.
 - (C) Going too fast on downhills.
 - (D) Riding at night without lights.

Please, also encourage your readers to wear eye protection, to avoid accidents due to loss of control caused by temporarily being blinded by sun, wind, bugs, or debris. To obey all traffic laws, and ride on the right side of the road with traffic (bicycles are vehicles!) To wear bright-colored clothing (orange or yellow best). And, if they must ride at night, to use proper lighting, both front and rear.

Iowan Carter LeBeau, speaker at the March meeting, mentioned we should feel grateful to the person who introduced us to cycling. One of my mentors was a cycling doctor who wrote for <u>Bicycling!</u> magazine in the early '70s. (This was back when the publishers were still fresh and excited enough to include an exclamation mark in the title). <u>My Life on Two Wheels</u>, by Clifford L. Graves has been out in first edition for at least a year.

From his cycling escape from advancing German tanks during World War Two, to his experiment with long distance time-trialing in France, Mr. Graves epitomizes the well-rounded cycle-tourist. After riding in the mountains for a day, he will don coat and tie for dinner and conversation with fellow cyclists and new aquaintances.

Graves himself mentioned that none of his outings lasted more than a couple of weeks -- the transcontinentals and round-the-world trips were left for others (who he nontheless admired for their durability and courage); but he tells the story of many of his rides with simple grace and readibility. Along the way he also speaks of his mentors -- Velocio, the mythic father of French cycling; and Thomas Stevens, the first transcontinental rider.

This is a classy book, with a classy price of course. But if you can drag yourself away from the book stalls @ K-Mart and plunk down the price, you'll learn more about what bicycling can and should be in one book than in thirty aerobic, lycra-clad, aerodynamic bicycle magazines.

It used to be complained that only the French could write about cycling. Mr. Graves has greatly enhanced the English cycling literature with his autobiography. Available from Manivelle Press P.O. Box 2220 LaJolla, Ca. 92038. Cost \$27.50, \$1.50 shipping and \$1.65 California state tax.

Many exciting improvements in bicycle technology are becoming more widespread in cycle shops today -- indexed "click" shifting; non-ferrous frames; 125 psi clincher tires; and teflon-smooth brake systems. Given these features, what bicycle seemed to attract the most attention in the shop during March? -- an early '50s Schwinn sold by the Voss brothers here in Peoria. Features? How 'bout knee-action front suspension, fender mounted headlight, and a horn mounted in the fake gas tank. More than a couple of gentlemen were reminded of first loves, and, for a time, overlooked the copious amounts of red hair dye and heavy makeup that keeps the old girl going.

Time trials have started at Cat-Mossville Saturday mornings at 7 a.m. Everyone is welcome and times will be published monthly in this newsletter. Novice cyclists to die-hards have checked their time for 10 miles against the clock. Need more information? Call me at 682-8777. I could still use a couple of volunteers.



Racer Report

The racing seasom was officially started when Randy Senneff and I traveled to Louisville for two rainy days of racing on Feb.28 and Mar.1. I finished 2nd in the Veteran race after initiating a two man break and then losing the uphill sprint.

On the second day, Randy finished with his pack for 8th place in a very windy and hilly 42 mile road race. I broke away alone 4 miles into the Veteran event and soloed the next 24 miles to finish 4 minutes

ahead of the pack.

The Vitesse racing team held a training race on our Eureka Road Course on March 8. Brett Rickett and I broke away on the second lap of five and Brett easily won the sprint. Eric Carlson led the pack in for 3rd place in the 18 mile event.

There was a 10 mile time trial held at Hampshire, Illinois on Mar. 22 and I took 1st and Mike Hagerty got 5th. Both of us were in the Vet.
