All club officers, committee chairs, interested members should plan on attending. Bring a friend or your spouse. Beverages will be provided, and we'll chip in to order pizza.





# \*\*\*\*\*4th Annual Spoon River Scenic Century\*\*\*\*\*

Sunday , Sept. 20, 1987 30-65-75-100 miles



Where: 65-75-100 mile routes start in Canton at the YMCA,1325 East Ash. The 30 mile loop starts at Putman Park, two miles south of Cuba on RT. 97 (APP. 12 MILES FROM CANTON).

The Spoon River Scenic Century offers cyclists beautiful scenery, lightly travelled roads (with several stretches of challenging hills), loads of home baked food and the first fresh apple cider of the fall season. Some scenic towns on the route are:

<u>Lewistown</u>- Ride by the cemetery made famous by Edgar Lee Masters in his *Spoon River Anthology*. Stop and see the Rasmussen Blacksmith Museum.

Bernadotte- Scenic view of the river and dam from the old iron bridge.

London Mills- See the miniature Statue of Liberty and the historic Ross Hotel.

Services- map with cue sheet, marked route, food stops, patch, sag service, and for the first 150 riders a certificate of achievement and special publication about century riding. Showers will also be available after the ride.

Lodging- A limited number of hospitality homes are available for pre-registered riders on a first come basis.


